BALLARAT PRIMARY SCHOOL (DANA ST)

MOBILE PHONES – STUDENT USE

POLICY

PURPOSE

To explain to our school community the Department's and Ballarat Primary School's policy requirements and expectations relating to students using mobile phones and other personal mobile devices during school hours.

SCOPE

This policy applies to:

1. All students at Ballarat Primary School and,
2. Students' personal mobile phones and other personal mobile devices brought onto school premises during school hours, including recess and lunchtime.

DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this policy, "mobile phone" refers to mobile phones and any device that is connected to or have a similar functionality to a mobile phone such as cellular smart watches/devices.

POLICY

Ballarat Primary School understands that students may bring a personal mobile phone to school, particularly if they are travelling independently to and from school.

At our School:

- Students who choose to bring mobile phones to school must have them switched off and securely stored during school hours
- Exceptions to this policy may be applied if certain conditions are met (see below for further information)
- When emergencies occur, parents or carers should reach their child by calling the school's office.

Personal mobile phone use

In accordance with the Department's [Mobile Phones Policy](#) issued by the Minister for Education, personal mobile phones must not be used at Ballarat Primary School during school hours, including lunchtime and recess, unless an exception has been granted.

Where a student has been granted an exception, the student must use their mobile phone for the purpose for which the exception was granted, and in a safe, ethical and responsible manner.

Secure storage

Mobile phones owned by students are considered valuable items and are brought to school at the owner's (student's or parent/carer's) risk. Students are encouraged not to bring a mobile phone to school unless there is a compelling reason to do so. Please note that Ballarat Primary School does not have accident insurance for accidental property damage or theft. Students and their parents/carers

are encouraged to obtain appropriate insurance for valuable items. Refer to the Department's [Personal Goods policy](#).

Where students bring a mobile phone to school, Ballarat Primary School will provide secure storage. Secure storage is storage that cannot be readily accessed by those without permission to do so. At Ballarat Primary School students are required to store their phones in the General Office, which is under staff supervision. A receptacle is provided for the phones.

Enforcement

Students who use their personal mobile phones inappropriately at Ballarat Primary School may be issued with consequences consistent with our school's existing student engagement policies [*Student Wellbeing and Engagement policy*, *Student Code of Conduct* and *Prevention of Bullying policy*.]

Inappropriate use of mobile phones is any use during school hours, unless an exception has been granted, and particularly use of a mobile phone:

- in any way that disrupts the learning of others
- to send inappropriate, harassing or threatening messages or phone calls
- to engage in inappropriate social media use including cyber bullying
- to capture video or images of people, including students, teachers and members of the school community without their permission
- to capture video or images in the school toilets, changing rooms, swimming pools and gyms
- during exams and assessments

Exceptions

Exceptions to the policy:

- may be applied during school hours if certain conditions are met, specifically,
 - Health and wellbeing-related exceptions
- can be granted by the principal, or by the teacher for that class, in accordance with the Department's [Mobile Phones Policy](#).

An exception for our school allowed under the Department's [Mobile Phones Policy](#) is:

Health and wellbeing-related exception

Specific exception	Documentation
Students with a health condition	Student Health Support Plan

Where an exception is granted, the student may only use the mobile phone for the purpose for which it was granted.



As Term Four is well underway and the year begins to come to a close, Japanese lessons have been full of excitement and engagement. This term saw the start of the Japanese Club at lunchtimes on a Monday. During these clubs, students have the opportunity to engage in Japanese themed interest, play Japanese games and complete Japanese crafts. Students can also use this club time to seek any assistance they may need with their Japanese work and understanding. This club is very new but has been met with much success, often having a high student attendance.

This term in Foundation and Year One and Two classes, students have been involved in a hands on cultural lesson focus. Students have delved into the world of imaginative texts and creative story retelling skills with a focus on the Japanese fairy tale - Momotaro (Peach Boy).

Our Year Three and Four students have been also involved in imaginative text types, focusing on their Japanese pronunciation skills. Students have been working in small groups to produce and practice a short play. These plays have aided students to develop problem solving, communication and self management skills as they work toward a finished product to present at the end of the year.

In Year Five and Six, students have been collaborating in pairs to create their own short story Manga. These manga stories have been driven by student interest and allow for students to expand on their knowledge of Japanese culture as well as their bank of Japanese vocabulary. Students have been inspired to put pride and their best efforts into their manga as they will be on display in the library in the last few weeks of the year for the whole school community to see. Copies of their manga will be made and donated to the library to start the development of a Manga Library here at Dana Street for future generations.

I have been very fortunate to be able to teach Japanese here at Dana Street and be a part of the community. I have loved being able to help students grow their passions, interests and knowledge, especially with Japanese knowledge and culture and I look forward to watching each and every student grow.

PERFORMING ARTS

In Performing Arts this term, all grades have been working on their ability to respond to the music they hear, using their knowledge and understanding of the elements of music.

FOUNDATION B AND F/IS:

Foundation and Grade 1 students have been learning the song "When I Build My House". Students have learned to pitch match, sing in time with their class and keep a beat. They have also composed their own lyrics within the call and response song structure.

GRADE 1/2:

Students in Grade 1/2 have been learning about music and drama through the topic of Monsters. They have improvised sounds, movements and actions that monsters might make, learned music about monsters, and also designed their own Purple People Eater.

GRADE 3/4:

Grade 3/4 students have been learning how to play various tuned and untuned percussion instruments to the song "I'm A Nut". Students play rhythmic ostinato patterns in time with one another to create polyrhythms while singing simple melodies.

GRADE 5/6:

Ukuleles continue to be heard from the Grade 5/6 classrooms. Students are gaining confidence in playing various chords and transitioning between them. They are exploring composition and improvisation through altering known songs before composing their own songs towards the end of term.


